Inspire to Grow Through Beautification, Preservation, Conservation, & Education

Plant This, Not That!

Take a moment to glance at the cover of our club newsletter, where our motto proudly states "Beautification, Conservation, Education." Today's gardening goes beyond merely enhancing the visual appeal of our properties; conservation has become increasingly crucial due to the pressures of overdevelopment and climate change on our planet. We are being urged to incorporate native plants into our landscapes to support insects, birds, and other wildlife. Many invasive plants are favored for their hardiness and abundant flowering and fruiting, but these very traits contribute to their invasiveness. Here are some alternatives to consider instead of invasive species.

The Tree of Heaven, an invasive species from China, boasts a striking feathery appearance. It spreads rapidly, overshadowing native trees and shrubs, and serves as a host plant for the Spotted Lantern Fly, an invasive insect recently identified in Georgia. This pest poses a significant threat, damaging agricultural crops like peaches and grapes, as well as hardwood trees. Instead, consider planting black walnut or sumac trees, such as *Rhus glabra*.

Autumn Olive is a vibrant deciduous shrub from Asia that grows quickly, displacing native plants. Opt for native yaupon holly or *Viburnum nudum* instead. These native shrubs produce beautiful red fruits that attract wild birds without being overly aggressive.

Ligustrum, or Chinese privet, is another prevalent invasive plant wreaking havoc in our natural spaces. A better choice would be native inkberry holly, which is evergreen and produces similar fruits, or consider native cherry laurel, *Prunus Caroliniana*.

Nandina is a common invasive species across the Southeast. While its striking red berries are visually appealing, they are toxic, leading to bird fatalities from the cyanide-laced fruit. Instead, try planting winterberry holly.

Callery pear trees are notoriously invasive, displaying lovely white blossoms in spring followed by small, inedible fruit. Instead, consider planting a redbud tree for spring color or a black tupelo tree for stunning fall hues.

Japanese spirea spreads through seeds. You can either deadhead the flowers immediately after blooming or choose to plant *Clethra alnifolia*, also known as sweet pepperbush.

Avoid using English ivy and Chinese wisteria. Instead, consider planting American wisteria, along with Carolina jessamine, wild ginger (as ground cover), or native scarlet honeysuckle in place of English ivy.

Plant This, Not That!

Cogon grass, along with many exotic ornamental grasses, is highly invasive. Opt for one of our native grasses, such as northern sea oats, panic grass, or bottlebrush grass (*Elymus hystrix*).

This is not an exhaustive list of invasive plants in Georgia. I encourage you to research the plants you plan to use for landscaping and consider replacing any invasives with native species that benefit pollinators, herbivores, birds, and other local wildlife. You can find lists of native plants and sources for purchasing them at www.coastalwildscapes.org. I've had wonderful experiences at Victory Gardens in Savannah, where the staff is both knowledgeable and helpful. (Victory Gardens 2500 Tennessee Ave, Savannah 31404)

Together, we can make a positive impact on our environment! As you continue gardening, keep this quote from Douglas Tallamy in mind: "The choices we make as gardeners can profoundly impact the diversity of life in our yards, towns, and on our planet."

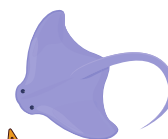

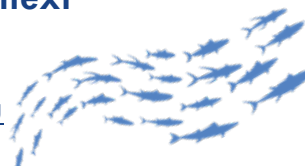

The Landings Garden Club, General Meeting Minutes: December 16, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 10:07 by President Vicki Menke. Vicki thanked Charlene Brown Carter for playing the piano during the social time. Vicki then asked if everyone had voted for the four tables presented for the “Merry Mingle.” Vicki explained “Winter Wonderland” was the theme for this year’s Merry Mingle.

We all recited the Pledge of Allegiance and Vicki read the prayers.

Vicki asked if everyone had read the minutes that had been published and distributed by email in the December newsletter. There was one correction concerning the title of the Skidaway Farm Project which Meg is chair of and that the proceeds of the garden go to the Social Apostolate for their soup kitchen. The minutes were approved as corrected.

President’s Report:

Committee Reports:

Janet brought sun choke tubers to the meeting and explained a bit about them. Edith Teifeld, former member and president of the Garden Club has died.

The General Meeting ended at 10:40 am.

Barbara presented the program. Sabrelle Smith from Sandfly Floral Shop gave us ideas and tips for decorating for Christmas.
