Sparrow Field

Although our volunteers are currently on a break, work at Sparrow Field continues. The Audubon Tallow Terrors, with assistance from the TLC Arborists, have tackled approximately 75 trees in the far-left corner of the field. Bartlett Tree Specialists were engaged to hedge and trim the verbenas and bottle brush, allowing more sunlight to reach the edge of the planting area. Invasive vines have been removed, and their roots treated. Additionally, the club arborist has taken down an unruly large palm.

Our irrigation requirements have also been addressed. The shorter sprinkler heads have been replaced with taller ones, enhancing their visibility for volunteers and improving the efficiency of water distribution. This upgrade will also help maintain the stability of the wall. The top row of the wall has been reset and is expected to hold well. We plan to resume weeding in early spring, weather permitting. There is always plenty of work to be done at Sparrow Field and we welcome all volunteers!

Skidaway Farms

My dedicated gardeners have been nurturing our winter crops, including cabbage, collards, broccoli, lettuce, and carrots, through the varying temperatures of the past few weeks. We covered the plants to shield them from the recent chill, and thankfully, everything has survived and is thriving.

We successfully harvested our first crop of lettuce, which weighed 14 pounds, alongside a large head of cabbage and 13 pounds of collard greens. Regrettably, the carrots were infested with worms, so we had to discard them. All of our harvest has been donated to the Savannah Union Mission to help prepare hot meals for those in need.

A heartfelt thank you to the Farm Team for their assistance with planting, weeding, and harvesting, especially to those who could join us at the last minute. A special shout-out goes to our master gardener, Jayne Rogers, who has been instrumental in teaching me the intricacies of managing the Farm plot.



Birds and Conservation

Native Plant Spotlight: Native Hollies

Native hollies come in various forms, ranging from towering trees to compact shrubs. Some serve as excellent hedges, while others stand out as striking accent plants. In the Southeast, three common varieties of hollies can be found: American, Yaupon, and Dahoon. These plants exhibit a range of leaf shapes and sizes, with growth forms that can vary from upright to weeping. All three types produce the glossy green leaves and red berries we often associate with "Christmas Holly."

Holly trees are dioecious, meaning they have both male and female specimens. Only the female trees bear berries, which are a great food source for wildlife.

American Holly (*Ilex opaca*)

This adaptable holly thrives in natural settings and can also be utilized as a landscape tree. This broad-leaved evergreen boasts a symmetrical, dense, and wide pyramidal shape. Its spiny, glossy evergreen leaves are beautifully complemented by clusters of red berries that persist through fall and winter. Additionally, the whitebark of these trees adds visual interest to their overall appearance.



Yaupon Holly (*Ilex vomitoria*)

Yaupon Holly comes in several cultivars, offering a variety of forms ranging from dwarf types that resemble boxwood to larger upright or weeping trees. The larger Yaupon Hollies can reach heights of 15 to 25 feet, with a similar width. In the landscape, these evergreens take about ten years to develop the distinctive vase shape they're known for.



Dahoon Holly (*Ilex cassine*)

Dahoon Holly is a sizable variety that can spread 8 to 12 feet and often reaches heights of 40 feet, although it is commonly seen at heights between 20 and 30 feet. The dark evergreen leaves range from 2 to 3 inches long, exhibiting a smooth, supple, and shiny texture with a few serrations near the tip. These trees produce a substantial number of berries that are favored by wildlife.



Incorporating native hollies as screens or accent plants supports our bird populations. They provide an abundant food source through their plentiful berries and offer shelter within their evergreen foliage. As you plan your landscape, be sure to consider these native hollies as beautiful enhancements for your garden.

January Bird of the Month, A Bird of Many Names: **Yellow-rumped Warbler, also known as Myrtle Warbler or Butter Butt**

The Yellow-rumped Warbler, affectionately known as the Butter Butt, gets its nickname from the striking yellow patch on its rump, which serves as a distinctive field mark for both males and females. This captivating group of birds is divided into two subspecies: the western Audubon Warbler and our local Eastern variety, the Myrtle Warbler.

The name "Myrtle Warbler" originates from their remarkable ability to digest the waxy coating of wax myrtle and juniper berries, making them a common sight in these shrubs throughout the Southeast during winter. They breed in the northern mixed forests of the U.S. and Canada, primarily feeding on insects, before migrating to the southern U.S. from November to May, where their diet shifts to mainly berries and any active insects. Myrtle Warblers are known to visit feeders for dried fruit and suet, and like many berry enthusiasts, they enjoy a refreshing drink and a bird bath.

In our community, the Myrtle Warbler is a relatively large warbler, measuring about 5 to 6 inches in length with a sturdy body. During the breeding season, this beautiful bird showcases bold dark and white markings. In winter, when we spot them, their plumage is less vibrant. Females resemble males but display lighter yellow hues. Nonetheless, the signature Butter Butt is always visible! The presence of Yellow-rumped Warblers offers yet another compelling reason to plant native shrubs, such as wax myrtle and native holly, in your garden.




